TRIGGERS

Common Advocacy Triggers	Corresponding Decision-makers		
Request to sign-on to letters and statements	 Advocacy Action Team: CEO, Board Chair, and Advocacy Chair 		
A national and/or global event occurs	 Urgent: CEO and Board Chair Non-urgent: Executive Committee, Advocacy Committee, and/or Board 		
>>> Member brings forward a request	Advocacy Committee		
Our research creates the opportunity to write and publish a position statement	Advocacy Committee and Board		
Need arises to refine long-term policy priorities	Advocacy Committee and Board		

STEPS

- 1 Step 1: Determine if the request is a NACE policy priority.
 - If it is a policy priority, this is an automatic yes to support the advocacy request. This completes the process.
 - If **no**, then continue the decision making by using the Advocacy Decision-Making Tool. (Move to Step 2.)
- 2 Step 2: Determine if the request is aligned to NACE's policy priorities.

• If **yes**, sign on/make statement. This completes the process.

If no, consider if this should become a priority.
 Each member of the Advocacy Action Team completes the tool. (Move to Step 3.)

- 3 Step 3: Total the points.
 - If two out of three votes are "yes," the issue is referred to the Advocacy Committee for consideration as a policy priority. A "yes" vote means an issue has garnered at least nine out of 13 total points available.
 - When an issue is referred to the Advocacy Committee, discussion/research are required before committing to a new policy priority.



CRITERIA

Is it a NACE policy priority?

(priorities list)

If yes, sign on.

If **no**, proceed with the tool.

Advocacy Decision-Making Tool

It is not a NACE policy priority, but is it aligned with or germane to those priorities?

Assess if the values and spirit of the request are similar to/in agreement with NACE's policy priorities.

If yes, sign on/make statement.

If **no**, consider if this should become a priority. The Advocacy Action Team completes the tool; if there are two "yes" votes out of three, the issue goes to Advocacy Committee to consider for inclusion as a NACE policy priority.

Criteria	Yes or No	Points
It fits within NACE's strategic plan or has a connection to association policy or guiding documents.		out of 3 max
It is an equity issue. The issue addresses systemic forms of oppression, presents possible solutions that can mitigate forms of inequality.		out of 3 max
Related to career services or university recruiting		out of 3 max
National level issue—federal rule, legislation, agency, etc. AND/OR State level issue that has the potential for national impact.		out of 2 max
Silence or speaking out/action would send a negative message. (There would be a significant risk to membership, reputation, or financial stability if NACE is silent OR speaks out.)		out of 1 max
Topic is an opportunity to lead or collaborate.		out of 1 max
